Description

Front: Kopf des Herakles mit Lorbeerkranz nach l. Darauf ein runder Gegenstempel mit Δ.

Rear: Nike mit Kranz und Palmzweig nach l. im l. F. innen OP.

Countermarked: The impression left by a countermark punch. A tool that is used to punch into a coin subsequent to the original striking an additional mark or symbol that had meaning in the contemporary context of the coin - for example to mark a specific payment or to revalue a coin). Objects from early modern collections sometimes bear countermarks as a sign of ownership.
